

How to Make a Cinemagraph in VideoStudio

In this tutorial, you'll learn how to make a beautiful cinemagraph using video footage you've taken.

A cinemagraph is created by combining a video clip with a still image to create a unique animated photo.

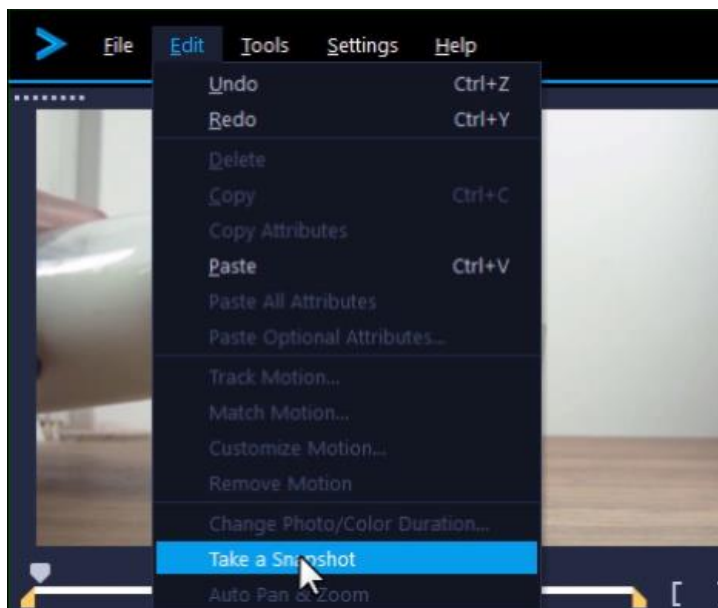
- Open up VideoStudio under the **Edit** tab.
- Import the video clip you're going to create a cinemagraph from.

Note: Choose a video clip that you've shot using a tripod in order to get the best results.

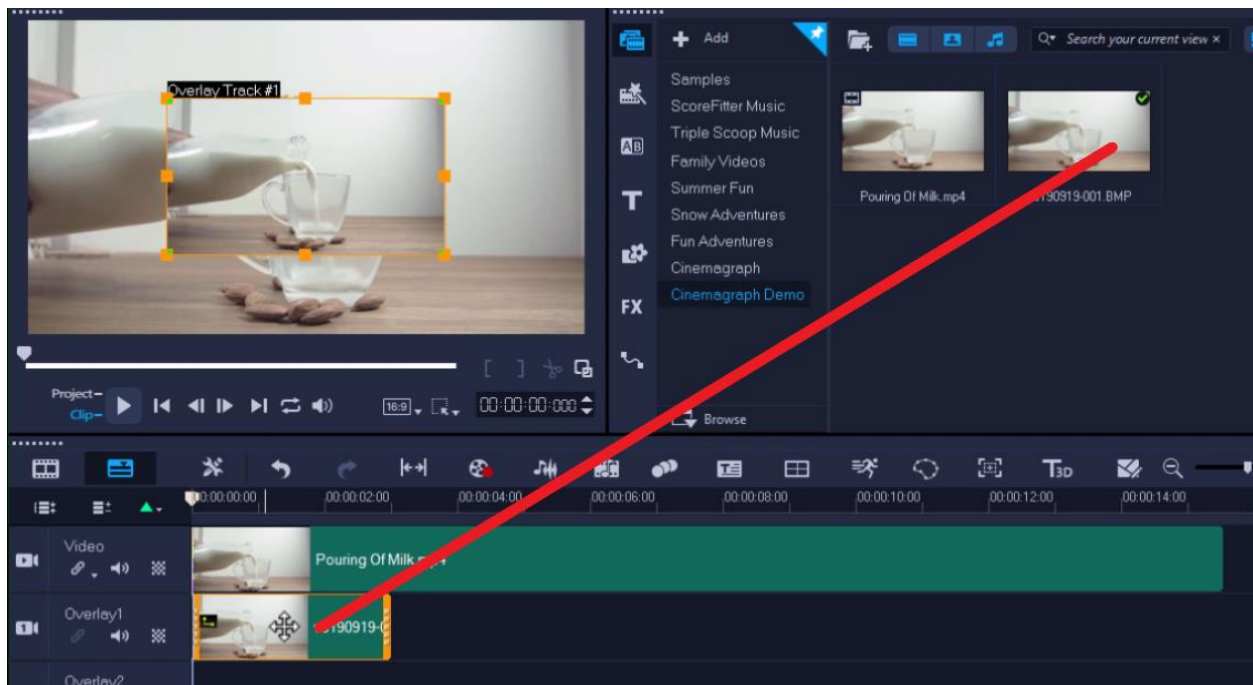
- Drag the video clip onto the Video Track on your timeline.

In this project, I am using a video of a milk bottle pouring milk into a teacup. I want to make the bottle stationary as the milk pours out and fills the cup.

- Drag the playhead to the point on the clip where you want to take a snapshot.
- Go to **Edit** and select **Take a Snapshot**. The snapshot of this still image is now saved in our library.

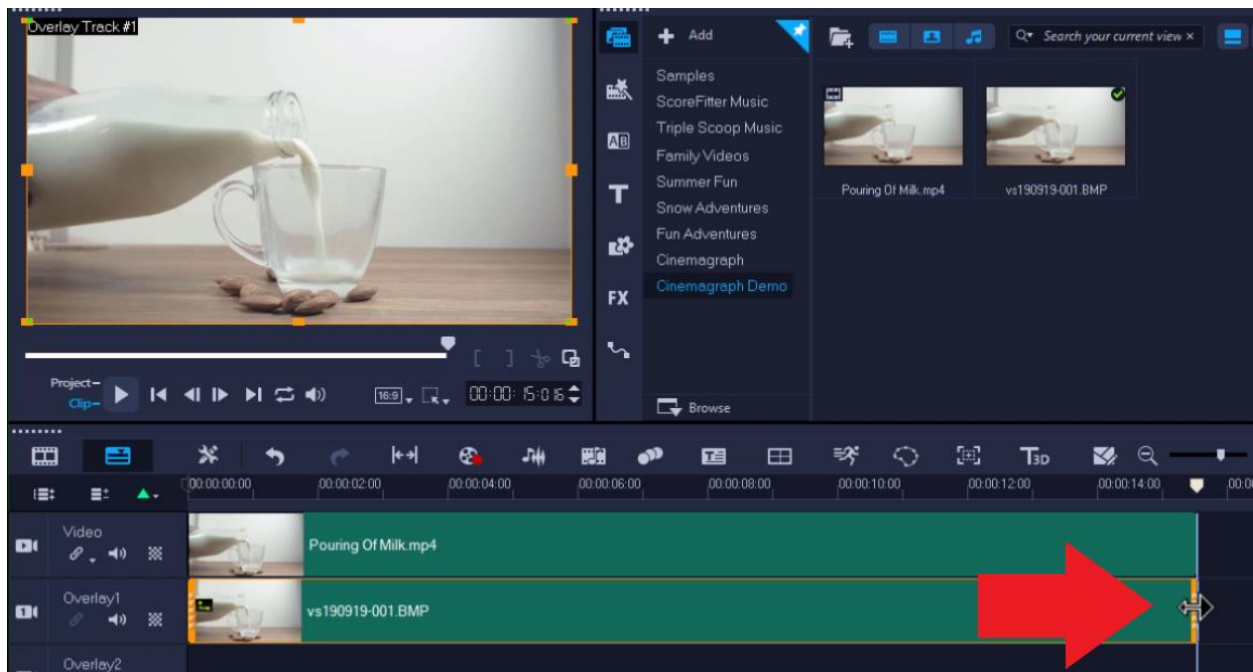


- Drag the snapshot from the library onto the **Overlay Track** on your timeline.



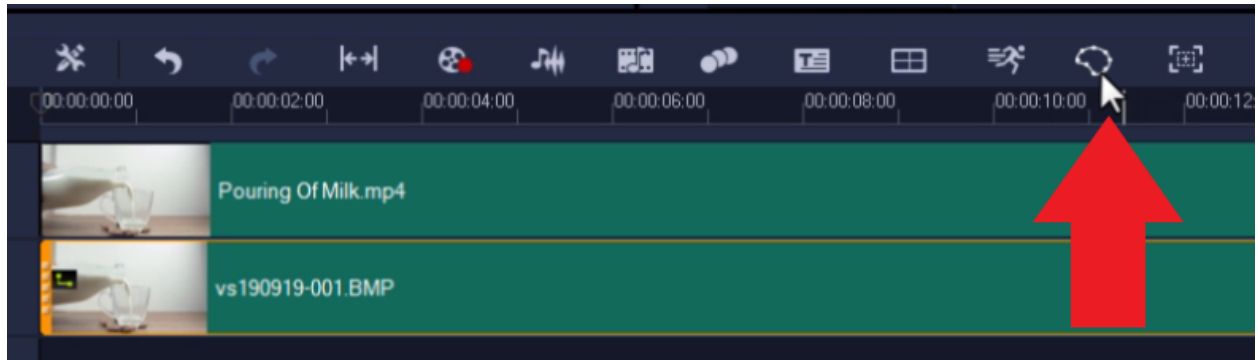
To resize the overlay to full screen to match the dimensions of the video on the video track:

- Right-click on the video clip on the timeline and select **Copy Attributes**.
- Then right-click on the overlay and select **Paste All Attributes**.
- Scroll your mouse to the edge of the snapshot until the arrow pops up and click and drag to the right to resize the snapshot until it matches the length of the video clip.

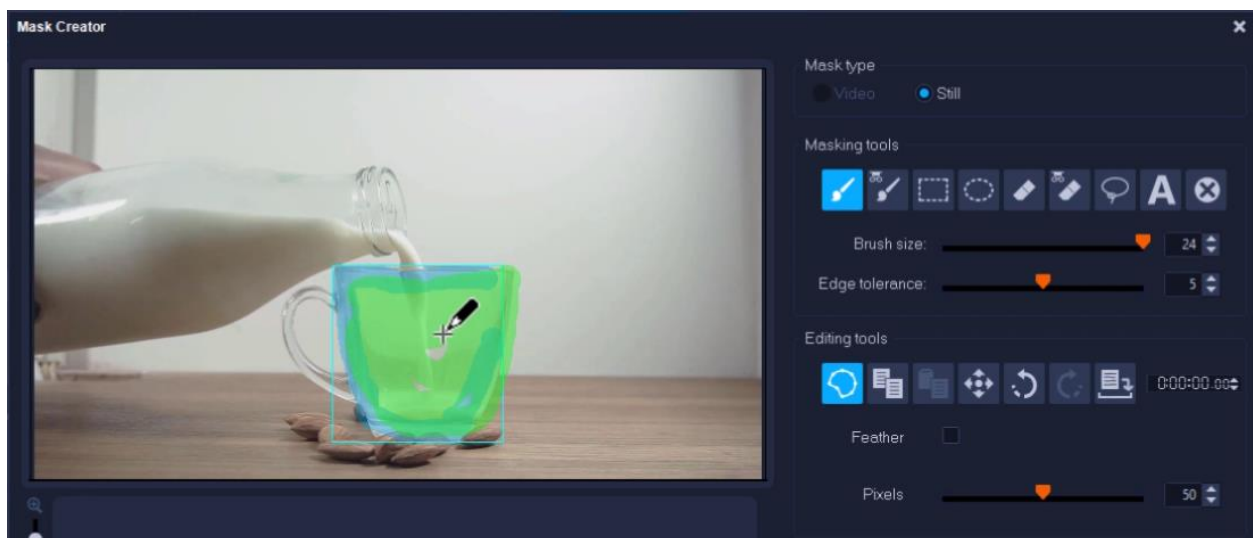


How to Create a Mask

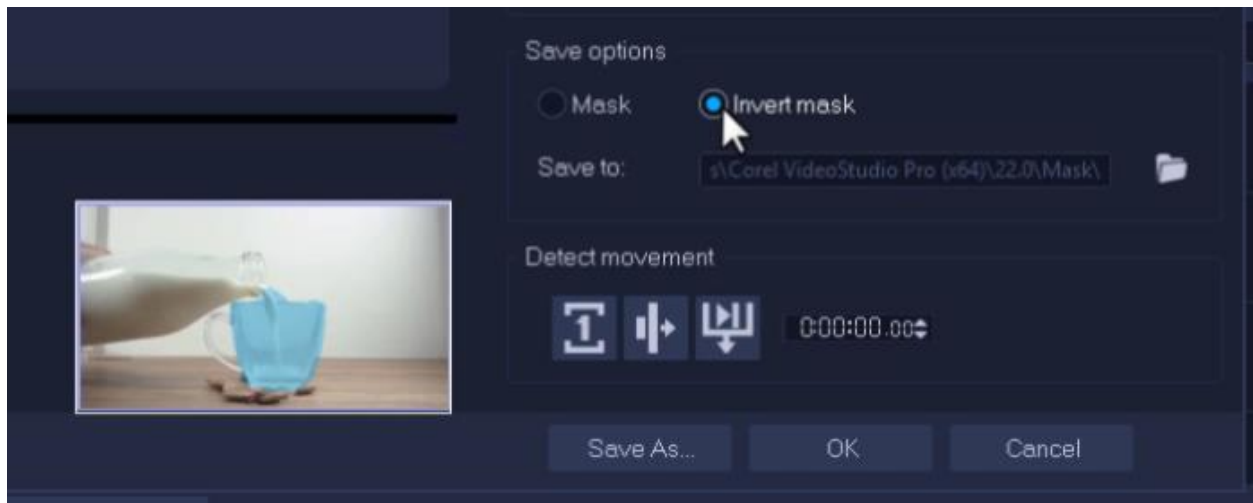
- Select the overlay on the timeline and then click on the **Mask Creator** icon.



- Brush over the area of the video where you want to show movement using one of the brush tools.
- Adjust the brush size as needed to be more precise with your selection.



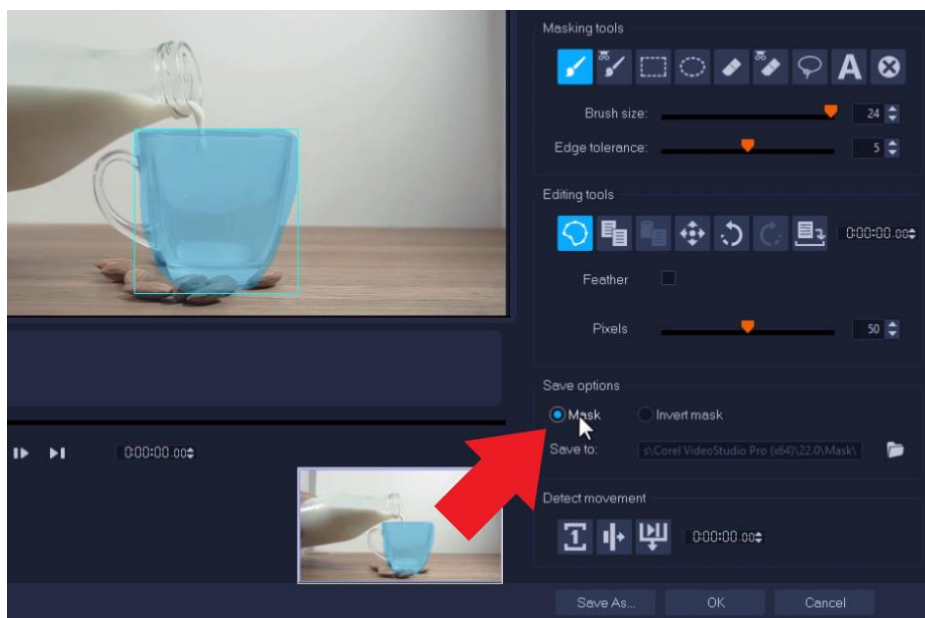
- Select **Invert Mask** and press **OK**.



And now if you preview this video, you'll see how the milk pours into the mug from the stationary bottle giving the video a really cool look and feel.

You can experiment with the masking tools to create different effects within the same video. For example, I could take this same video and image snapshot and this time make the mug stationary so that it looks like the milk is endlessly pouring and never filling up the mug.

- Go to the **Mask Creator** and again use the brush tool to brush over the mug.
- This time, I won't select **Invert Mask** and I'll keep it as **Mask**.
- Then click **OK**.



And now if you preview this video, you'll see the milk jug keeps pouring milk into the mug without ever filling it.



How to Loop or Lengthen your Cinemagraph

You may choose to play the entire video on loop or choose a specific section to loop.

To split the video track into a section you want to play on loop:

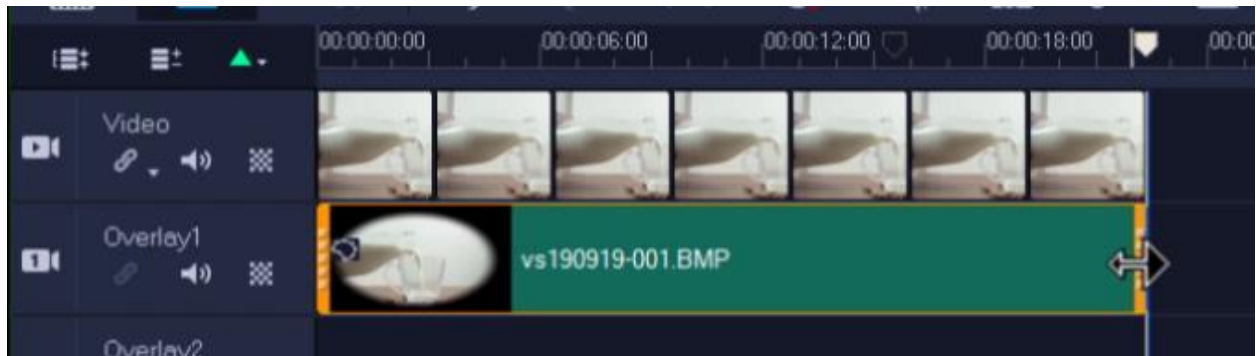
- Drag your playhead to where you want to split the video clip and click the scissors icon under the preview pane.
- Delete the remaining video clip by clicking on it and pressing the **Delete** key on your keyboard.
- Right-click on the video clip and click **Copy**, and then click once with your mouse beside the video clip to paste it next to it.



Repeat this same process for as long as you want to run your loop for.

Resize the snapshot to match the length of the video clips:

- Click on the snapshot on the timeline and hover your mouse at the edge of the clip until the arrow icon pops up.
- Then click and drag the snapshot until it matches the length of the clip.



Now if you press preview, you'll see the cinemagraph repeats on loop.
